# Soon to celebrate 120 years

Mount Somers Village residents and those driving through recently, will have noticed a change when they look up the hill to the church.

To W.A.P. Clarkson, Architect, Christchurch. 22 August 1898

have carefully looked through the specifications for the Mount Somers Church and have pencilled crosses at certain places with numbers and enclose memoranda with corresponding numbers... I am not quite clear, as to how you propose to nail the iron roofing. I do not consider that the boards would give sufficient hold. Did you enquire about the corrugated iron battens to lay on top of the iron? Do you find Baltic good timber for outside door frames? I should have thought Totara would have been better... I will talk matters over with Mr. Purchas before posting this and may add a note or two afterwards. If not, you may take it for granted that this

letter is sent with his approval. I hope you will not mind my making so many notes, etc. on your specifications. We like the look of the Church in the Prospective Sketch I brought back....'

Some notes are added with Specifications returned to Mr Clarkson; 'Birch boards under iron in bell-tower would be liable to curl up. Alford Forest white pine would be better. Snow board would be required in gutter between bell-tower and Church roof. Weather boards should be primed before being fixed.'

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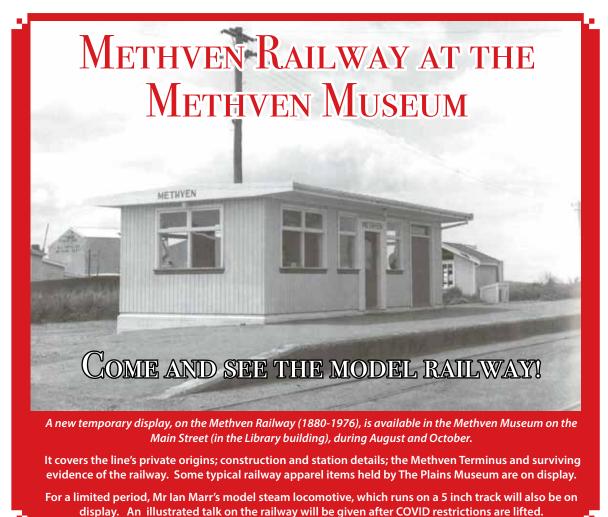

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# Make it Legal

Four out of five Kiwis know cannabis prohibition does not work. Over 70% say that controls on possessing and growing cannabis would deliver better outcomes.

The Bill we will vote on in the referendum confines cannabis use to a home or licensed premises, brings in a minimum age (20+), has a limit on potency, puts health warnings on the packaging, reduces the illicit market, bans advertising and puts controls on growing at home

It is the control that people are looking for! Yet, support for the Cannabis Legalisation and Control Bill still hovers around 50%. We obviously still need to give this some serious discussion and thought.

People have some concerns about what may happen if the law changes. The experience of places like Colorado and Canada which have legalised provides a useful guide as to what is likely to happen here.

Drug driving is one of these concerns. However, the American Journal Of Public Health reports, "Three years after recreational marijuana legalisation, changes in motor vehicle crash fatality rates for Washington and Colorado were not statistically different from those in similar states without recreational marijuana legalisation." Canada's police force has also noticed no increase in drivers using cannabis since legalisation in 2018.

Effective public health messaging is our best way to educate and deter impaired driving, but the illegal status of cannabis makes it much harder to put out good effective messaging that will be taken seriously.

Nor has cannabis use itself gone up much in states that have legalised. Why? Because prohibition deters very few who want to use cannabis. In Canada, youth usage is down near 10%. The group now enjoying cannabis more are 55+ folk, for both its health and recreational benefits.

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Larry Wolk, the former director of the Colorado Department of Public Health puts it well: "We have not experienced any significant issues as a result of legalisation."

The law will not make cannabis "safe." What the law can do is make it safer.

On top of any potential harm from cannabis itself, prohibition generates numerous other harms; association with the criminal underworld, easy and dangerous access for youth, no product safety standards or potency controls, profits for organised crime, and the effects of a criminal history on people's life prospects. The law isn't fit for purpose



and it needs to change. A "No" vote is a vote for the failed regime that is prohibition.

The Cannabis Legalisation and Control Bill is a chance to minimise these harms. It doesn't create a cannabis market; it puts controls and regulations on the one that already exists. It's a pragmatic bill and I encourage people to find out more about it and cast "Yes" as their vote on 17 October.

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# Vote for your right to smoke

The purpose of the Legalisation of Cannabis Bill is to reduce harm to individuals in our communities, however the question for many voters is; will it work? How will it work? What does it look like long term?

The Euthanasia Referendum is immediately binding, whereas the Cannabis Referendum is not. Many voters think they are voting on whether or not medicinal cannabis should be permitted. Medicinal cannabis is already legal in New Zealand, although cost prohibitive for many, as it is unsubsidised.

In the USA pre-legalisation, it was predicted that the crime rate would drop as the black market and fund supply to gangs dried up, however analysis showed it had very little, if any impact. Gangs simply continued to supply below the retail rate.

When the drinking age was lowered here a number of years ago, it was meant to

prevent under age drinking. In fact, what it did do, was give younger people access to alcohol. Emergency services, community support groups and whanau have had to, and continue to pick up the pieces since.

Medicinal cannabis is already legal in New Zealand... although unsubsidised.

The bill sets the legal age of cannabis use at 20 years. In 2018, 14% of 14-15 year olds reported using cannabis compared to 19% in 2012. Other countries found a significant increase in youth cannabis associated

emergency department visits following legalisation with larger numbers requiring treatment for psychiatric or acute medical symptoms following cannabis use. There is a relationship between schizophrenia and cannabis use.

In 2018, there were 95 people killed in preventable road accidents due to drug driving. The NZ Government plans to roll out roadside drug testing in New Zealand and Police will use an oral fluid test to test for drugs. Police will test for THC (cannabis), methamphetamine, opiates, MDMA (ecstasy), and benzodiazepines. Some prescription drugs will also be tested for, but Associate Minister of Minister of Transport Julie Anne Genter said there would be a medical defence for people who were driving with drugs in accordance with their prescription, although just how this worked had not yet been developed.

Overseas information shows that there is a slight increase in cannabis consumption in adults where cannabis has been legalised.

Data in New Zealand is hard to find as recreational cannabis use is still illegal, however up to 80% of adults say they have tried it. Tested waste water in New Zealand reflects a high drug use per capita.

In legalised countries, tobacco and alcohol companies have heavily invested in the freshly created cannabis industry.

In our country, large and small corporates alike are lining up preparing for legalised cannabis use. Are we prepared for potentially the next "profiting-from-addiction based industry?" If we recognise that there are harms associated with cannabis, then legalisation is not the way to address those harms. How will access to social, health and family/whanau support be improved from our current services which are already stretched. What funding is earmarked

How will the legalisation of cannabis affect businesses? The Bill will not change workplace health and safety issues and current law, however, it potentially can make it harder for employers who may have to find replacement staff at the last minute, due to an "under the influence employee" being unable to work. Right now, businesses don't need any extra stress!

Ask questions. Do your homework and make an informed decision.

In New Zealand, we proudly take our place on the international democratic stage, giving women the right to vote, but are we as prudent and astute with our vote when it comes to thinking about the effects on a community of cannabis legalisation, or are we thinking of our rights as individuals?

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# **Coding at MPS** to make a sandwich and if the instructions weren't quite up to scratch the end result - the sandwiches, wouldn't be produced

Kia ora koutou (hello everyone),

This term the Mahuri Hub have been learning about coding in class. We are doing our best to prepare our students for the everchanging advancements in technology by introducing students to a range of technical skills. For anyone who is uncertain about what coding is, it is about writing the script or instructions that allow us to navigate our way through computer software, apps and websites.

Teaching coding to 5 year olds is not quite what you would expect, as it doesn't always involve electronic gadgets but focuses on being methodical and following instructions. Last week in class we discussed with our students the steps to making a jam sandwich. The students were learning about giving detailed and accurate instructions on how

to make a sandwich and if the instructions weren't quite up to scratch the end result - the sandwiches, wouldn't be produced correctly. Miss McLeod did a great job demonstrating this when a student told her simply to "put butter on the bread" and she used her fingers to spread the butter on – the student's were shocked and learnt very quickly that their instructions had to be more comprehensive.

Our students loved being involved in the hands-on learning experience as they got to follow the collective instructions and make their own sandwiches. They also loved the outcome, getting to eat their jam sandwiches! It turned out to be both a great technical and practical lesson as some students were almost foreign to such tools as the humble butter knife.

The lesson was a great reminder that learning can happen in many forms. It was also very rewarding to hear that students

were keen to show of f their skills at home. Annabelle came home and told her Mum; "I will make my sandwich today Mum, because I know how. We did it at school."





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# Why are we learning this stuff?

This is the second article in a series of four by Dr Chris Jansen from Leadership Lab and Dr Cheryl Doig from Think Beyond that profiles the shifts that are happening in many secondary schools towards more future-focussed and flexible learning opportunities.

Learning in our schools is designed around the New Zealand Curriculum, a curriculum document that currently enables a great deal of flexibility in approach. The first half of the curriculum document focusses on a vision for developing "confident, connected life-long learners" and the second half is organised into eight key learning areas, such as English, Maths, Science and so forth, that we are all familiar with. But the world is changing and these eight learning areas do not necessarily fall neatly into the diverse range of contexts and applications that are increasingly common in our workplace and society. There is also an increasing demand for skills such as collaboration, creativity, critical thinking and communication and increasingly employers are looking for people who are able to work confidently and creatively across integrated content areas.

Until recently our secondary schools have organised their learning programmes strictly into the eight learning areas each with discreet and separate knowledge sets. The result of this is strongly defined departments with very little collaboration between them. However, many schools are now exploring integrating two or more existing learning areas by designing multidisciplinary units of work based around authentic real-world contexts. These can be known as project-based learning, curriculum integration or cross-subject learning. Some of the demonstrated benefits of these more integrated approaches to curriculum design are increased engagement levels of students and development of skills such as initiative, curiosity and problem-solving.

Rangiora High School for example has developed a connected curriculum in years 9 and 10 where students explore "passion projects" that require individual students to select topics of interest and then investigate industry sources of information in specific areas; one student is currently studying Marine Biology and Underwater Photography. Benefits reported include students feeling a strong sense of ownership by designing their own learning. Scott Wright (Deputy Principal) describes the school's focus on slowly putting control back towards students: "Students can do it if they are given a chance."

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In Canterbury during 2018, the NCEA kickstart project involved ten secondary schools exploring ways that they could merge traditionally siloed subjects at senior secondary level by co-designing assessment tasks to fit more than one subject area. NZQA (New Zealand Qualifications Authority), assisted by critiquing the tasks to ensure reliability and validity at NCEA Level 1. This resulted in a range of crosscurricular assessments that allows students to experience success from a number of achievement standards from different subject-related domains. One school has since established an innovative integrated prototype class of Year 11 students who spend the majority of their week working with several teachers in a cross-curricular collaborative environment to learn and achieve successfully at NCEA Level 1.

Finally, some schools are interested in exploring new knowledge that is being generated at an exponential rate across the globe, with strong themes of technological change, environmental sustainability and local/global connections as drivers. New school subjects and blocks of learning are the result, for example, the St Thomas of Canterbury curriculum includes subjects such

as Sustainability (a combination of History, Geography and Biology) and a Forensics course (a combination of Science, Maths and Technology).

From a wider perspective, ChristchurchNZ is developing Supernodes which focus on high growth industries, namely Future Transport and Aerospace, Health-tec and Resilient Communities and Future Food, Fibre and Agritech. Local secondary schools are showing an interest in using such resources to develop new models of curriculum, intentional curriculum design and future pathways for learners. Changes to curriculum have implications for the training and recruitment of teachers, qualification structures and models of ongoing professional learning so that students have access to a future-focussed and flexible curriculum while at school.

The above is the first of a series of articles which will feature in Snowfed for their relevance, over the coming weeks.

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# Water testing with Room 1

On Monday, 10th August, the Room 1 students at OLS ventured on a field trip to a stream in Methven to be young scientists.

We used a School Kit where we used different ways to measure the health of a water body. There were a series of unique tests with apparatus that were assigned to students to conduct at the site. Before we headed out, we spent a few weeks familiarising ourselves with all the equipment and vocabulary that we would need to understand. We also spent time researching different species of plants and animals that we may encounter.

Here is what the students had to say:

"When we got to the waterway, Mrs Naidoo marked each metre with a marker so we could find and research a zone equally. In my zone, I got things that came from animals! I found a hedgehog quill, a rat jaw and also a stick-cased caddis." Matthew, Y6.

"The reason we went was because they are testing all the local creeks to see how healthy our water ways are." *Isabel, Y6.* 

"We tested the temperature and we measured the width, length and depth. We also tested the clarity of the stream." *Lucy, Y8.* 

"The water flow test was my favourite test of the day. My least favourite part was when I got in the water. We found lots of living species." *Elliott, Y4*.

"We all had gumboots to go in the water. I thought that I had small boots but they were just right. When we got in the water, it was squishy. The water flow was a bit strong. It almost felt like it pushed me. Then Matthew found a stick-cased caddis, it laid two fascinating eggs." Alex, Y4.

"When I stepped into the water, I was so



freezing cold, it felt like I was in the North Pole. I tested how cold the water was using a thermometer, I also checked how clean the water was." *Katalina, Y4*.

I forgot my gumboots and water proof clothes so I was just recording. We used oranges to see how fast the stream was going and we used a thermometer to see how cold it was in different areas. It was really fun!" *George, Y3.* 



On the bank there were loads of periphyton. After that I took the temperature of my water, it was 4.9°C. I kept falling over. After that I was freezing cold." *Harry, Y7*.

The students took so much away from this experience. One of the favourites were classifying the different species that they had found. This stimulated many conversations between students of different ages which was fantastic! Every student was engaged, even the ones that forgot their gumboots!



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# Calcium - more than just Bone Health!

We all know we need calcium for strong bones. Around 99% of our body's calcium is stored in our skeleton and teeth. However, the remaining 1% in our bloodstream plays a critical role in a number of functions.

These functions include aiding the electrical system of the heart, blood coagulation, muscle contractions, and functioning of the nervous system. It also acts like a 'co-pilot' in different metabolic reactions around the body helping them to run effectively.

recommended daily requirements of calcium are 1,000mg for healthy adult males aged 19-70 years and females aged 19-50 years. As bone loss accelerates after menopause in women and men over 70 years, calcium requirements increase to 1,300mg daily. Children aged 12-18 years also require more calcium (1,300mg). Think of consuming calcium like saving for your retirement, although you may not see the benefits now, consuming calcium each day will mean you have good calcium savings for retirement (aka good bone health). Lack of savings in the bone bank now can lead to frail and porous bones later in life, otherwise known as osteoporosis.

Dairy products are without a doubt some of the richest food sources of calcium, but not the only sources. As an example, 34 cup (180g) of the "Anchor Protein +" unsweetened yoghurt will provide you with 357mg of calcium, or 1 cup (250mL) of calci-trim/ yellow top milk will provide you with 457mg of calcium. If you were to include these two foods with your breakfast you have already met 81% of your calcium requirements for the day - easy! Where it can become more difficult is for people who do not consume dairy due to intolerance, allergies, or personal beliefs. For people consuming a dairy-free diet it is important to be really smart about consuming calcium from non-dairy sources. Additionally, like other minerals such as iron, the bioavailability of the mineral needs to be considered, which basically means how much of that mineral can be absorbed from the food consumed. For example, you can consider spinach as a dairy-free calcium source with half a cup of cooked spinach containing around 130mg of calcium, but only 5% of this is absorbed as it has low bioavailability.

Calcium food source inspiration:

- 40g Edam cheese 396mg
- 2 poached eggs 50mg
- 1 cup blackberries 77mg
- Regular latte 275mg
- · 2 dried figs 64mg
- 2 slices grainy bread 40mg
- 125g cottage cheese 95mg
- 250mL fortified soy milk 400mg\*
- 30g almond 75mg
- 90g canned sardines 300mg

\*When choosing dairy-free milks ensure

they are fortified with calcium at levels of 120mg/100mL or more.

#### Myth busting on dairy

Dairy products are high in sugar. FALSE. Unsweetened yoghurts and milk alongside cheese do not have added sugar. The only sugar in these products is natural sugar from the cow called lactose. Lactose sugar in unsweetened milk naturally occurs in quantities of 4.8q/100mL.

Dairy causes weight gain. FALSE. Research has shown people who included three servings of dairy on calorie-controlled diets lost more weight than people who consumed less dairy.

Lactose intolerance is the same as dairy intolerance. FALSE. People with lactose intolerance can typically consume a certain amount of lactose without symptoms. Some dairy products such as hard cheeses have very little to no lactose in them and are tolerated very well.

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# **GROW YOUR OWN**

My tomato and lettuce seeds that were planted in seed raising mix and placed on a heated bed have germinated. I put the trays of seedlings in the greenhouse for maximum light, but brought them back inside on the really cold frosty nights we have had lately, in case they got frosted. I'll prick them out into individual pots once they're a bit bigger.



The recent warm sunny days prompted me to get serious in the tunnelhouse, which I had ignored all winter. I weeded and dug in preparation for planting lettuce, silverbeet, spinach, peas and broccoli.

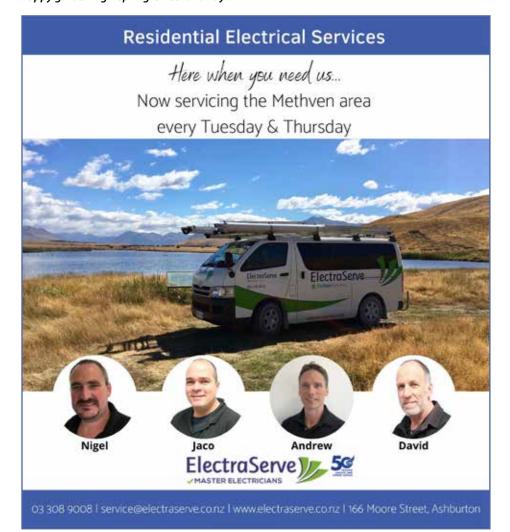
Spinach and silver beet grow well in cool spring weather, but may bolt by late summer. Still, it's worth planting some in spring to get some nice early greens. I plant all these in the tunnelhouse because it protects them from the elements but it doesn't get too hot like the greenhouse. It also prevents the birds eating them – if I planted them outside I would have to cover them with netting.

Planting in stages is a better plan that doing it all at once. The crops that like cooler weather go in first (of course), such as the aforementioned lettuce, silverbeet and spinach. Potatoes can also go in early (but not yet); even though they are vulnerable to frost they grow well in cool conditions. Peas like cool weather – they can be sown from September onwards.

Brassicas are very adaptable – they tolerate cool weather but can also manage heat if they have plenty of water. I think it's best either to plant early or late: I will buy punnets of broccoli, cabbage and cauli seedlings and plant them soon, and not plant more until autumn as I'd prefer to eat "real" summer veges (beans, zuchinnis, etc) during summer.

In the outside garden, I've dug up the rest of the parsnips as they were starting to produce new green tops, which means they will soon start to bolt (going to the reproductive phase which makes them tough to eat). Leeks and carrots are also not far away from bolting so use them up soon too.

Happy gardening – spring is not far away!

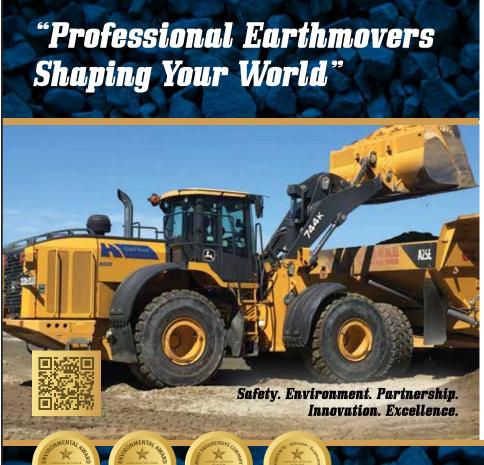
