### Rakaia Gorge **Conservation** work

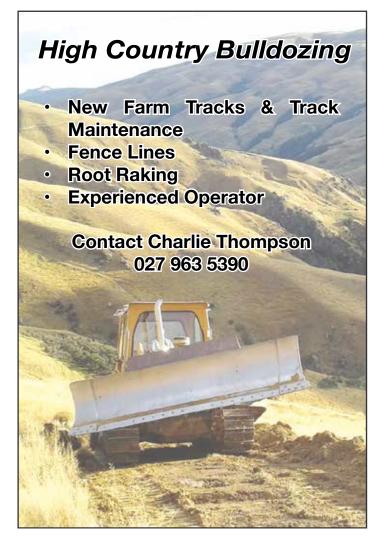
What progress we made for the fantails in the bush!

In fact the forest looks lovely, new growth everywhere and an energy almost palpable. Seed production in full swing. Saplings pushing up in the undergrowth and of course busy birds feeding the young ones. And everything has a better chance of survival. The seeds will be there for the birds, the new plants will grow into bigger ones all because there are fewer possums around as we have now removed more than 200 of them! Now that is good news.

Our traps extend now from our access point at Terrace Downs down the river for about 1km to the lookout above the Rakaia. There are now over 40 traps which we check three or four times a week. We have three lines: Piccadilly Line, Circle Line and the newest one: Waterloo Line. Our access point is called Central Station. Makes it all more fun! And I can better remember where all the traps are!

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# Public Notice Speed limit changes

### New speed limits on some Mid Canterbury roads come into force in December 2020.

Council recently completed its Speed Limit Review for local roads, following a public consultation process which included requests from the community. Some speed limits are changing to reflect the growth and development around towns and ensure safe and appropriate speed limits are in place. The changes will be made in three stages.

The first stage of speed limit changes will come into force on Friday 11 December, 2020. The areas where speed limits are changing are in Tinwald, Methven, Mt Somers, Mayfield, Fairton and the Ashburton Business Estate.

"John was just great to work with," said Rose.

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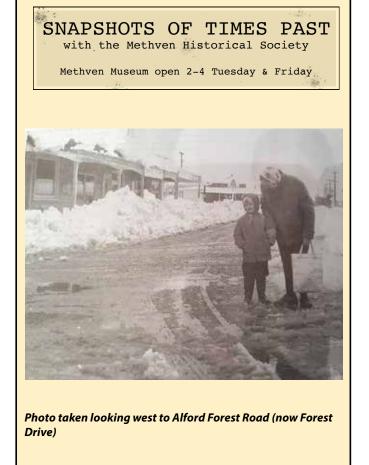
John is described as unique, kind, and good to families who live here.

Protein is one of the awesome macronutrients crucial to keep our bodies rebuilding, regenerating, healthy, and strong!

If your protein intake is evenly distributed over the day and you are meeting your total daily requirements from a wide variety of sources, the need for protein powder reduces significantly.

Meeting your total daily protein requirements predominantly through wholefoods needs to be the priority, rather than using protein powder at every meal and snack because it is convenient. However, protein powders can certainly be an effective tool in your nutrition toolbox.

#### Pros of protein powder:

Convenience: protein powder is an efficient way to get in a lot of protein

when your requirements are particularly high, it can be useful when appetite is suppressed after training to ensure you are still getting nutrition on board, and it can bump up protein at breakfast for those who struggle to eat enough or don't eat dairy or eggs.

- Cost effective: protein powders are cost effective if you are comparing price per portion compared to other rich protein sources such as chicken breast, egg, and milk. For example, some whey proteins can cost as little as \$1 for 15g of protein.
- Quality: most protein powders are high quality which is really important,

especially for initiating muscle protein synthesis. However, not all are made equal, as outlined below.

#### Cons of protein powder:

- Lack of micronutrients: protein powders are not typically fortified with the vitamins and minerals we would consume from wholefoods, as they are not designed to be a meal replacement. For example, a beef steak provides highly bioavailable vitamin B12, iron, zinc, and niacin, but protein powders do not.
- Bigger up-front cost: even though protein powders are cost effective, they are generally a less regular and bigger

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up-front cost. Buying in store will always be more expensive than buying online, pick wisely and shop smart.

No added benefit: if you are meeting your total protein needs through whole foods alone, additional protein powder will not magically transform you, regardless of clever marketing.

#### What should I look for in a protein powder?

Choose a reputable New Zealand or Australian company. Per serving of protein, (usually 30 -40g of powder) you ideally want greater than 20g protein, less than 5g of carbohydrates and less than 5g of fat. This will ensure you are paying for a good protein powder and not a meal replacement.

#### What is the best protein powder for me?

Whey Protein Isolate:

Whey Protein Isolate (WPI) is the gold standard of powders and is relatively cheap. WPI is excellent for initiating muscle protein synthesis (MPS) as it is rapidly absorbed by the body which is why it is recommended after workouts. WPI has an ideal amino acid profile and is also one of the lowest in fat and carbohydrates compared to other protein powders. As it is low in carbohydrates, it means it is also low in the natural sugar from dairy products, lactose. For this reason, WPI is typically well tolerated in people with lactose intolerance.

#### Whey Protein Concentrate:

Whey Protein Concentrate (WPC) is similar to WPI, but often even cheaper. The only difference between WPC and WPI is that WPC

has slightly more fat and carbohydrates, which means slightly more lactose. people without lactose intolerance or those who aren't needing to meet specific macronutrient targets, would typically recommend WPC simply because it is cheaper.

Hydrolysed Whey Protein:

This protein sounds fancier but really just costs you more money. Hydrolysed Whey Protein has been processed in a way that it is supposedly meant to "pre-digest" the protein allowing it to be more rapidly absorbed by the body. However, there is limited evidence to support that it is superior over WPI or WPC.

This protein is also from dairy but is much more slow acting compared to whey protein. As it is slow acting, it is not typically recommended after working out if the goal is rapid recovery. It can have applications when consumed prior to bed for individuals who have really high protein requirements (e.g. body builders) as the night-time period can be six hours or more without any protein ingested. Again, if total protein requirements are met throughout the day then the importance of protein before bed reduces significantly.

Soy is the one of the best plant-based

alternatives to dairy-based proteins. It has a complete amino acid profile and is low in fat and carbohydrates. It doesn't quite support muscle recovery as rapidly or to the extent of WPI, but if overall protein intake is met throughout the day, soy protein provides

similar results overall.

Pea protein behaves similarly to WPI in terms of MPS. Unfortunately, pea protein is low in an amino acid called methionine. If using pea protein, it is important to combine with another source of protein such as rice protein to address this issue. Pea proteins are typically more expensive and can have a chalky texture depending on how they are prepared.

Rice:

Rice protein in isolation is not recommended as it is low in the essential amino acids lysine and leucine. Rice protein also performs poorly when compared to other proteins. The good news is, it is high in the amino acid methionine, the amino acid pea protein lacks, and this is why many companies combine pea AND rice protein together. A protein powder with pea and rice combined is a good alternative to whey protein. As mentioned above it is typically more expensive and can have a chalky texture.

In summary, you should always prioritise wholefoods and use protein powders as a tool to help with your protein intake. Depending on your dietary requirements, there is a protein powder to suit everyone. Most importantly, choose a protein powder that fits your budget and you enjoy.

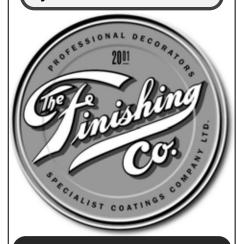

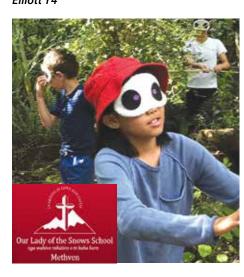
"We had a pillow fight in the blue room, it was crazy fun! We also had ice pops." Alex Y4

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### FROM MY DESK

### Responding to the impact of COVID



These are uncertain times. COVID has cast a shadow across the world. The global health and economic consequences will be with us for some time and New Zealand and Mid Canterbury, will not be immune.

We are, however, well placed to weather the storm and we can emerge from it stronger, especially here in Rangitata where our primary production backbone has meant that we are in a better position than hoped.

Our success in fighting the virus, protecting lives and livelihoods, has put us in a better position than many other countries in the world. Earlier this month, we saw lower than anticipated unemployment numbers, positive merchandise export figures, and a recent boost in consumer and business confidence.

We did not achieve these results by chance. We went hard and early with a clear plan that we stuck to. When issues arose, we moved to fix them as quickly as possible. The response worked. But we do still face challenges.

Employment figures tell us that women have been disproportionately affected by COVID. The underutilisation rate – indicating when employees are working fewer hours than they would like to, has also been higher for women.

In part, this reflects the fact that women tend to be more represented in sectors like retail and hospitality. These sectors, with support from the wage subsidy, have largely come back since Alert Level 4 and people have been reemployed or newly employed.

What remains true is that around the world, the pandemic's toll on employment is heavier for women.

As a Government we are acutely aware of this fact and we will remain focussed on ensuring that our economic recovery responds to it.

Our first objective is to ensure New Zealanders are kept safe from COVID. In keeping New Zealanders safe, we protect jobs, livelihoods, and strengthen our economy.

Second, the ongoing impact of COVID on the global economy is the most significant risk to our future growth. The virus' spread abroad will have a downstream impact on our exporters and impact economic activity domestically.

New Zealand will be cushioned from that slump by our five point economic plan to foster jobs and growth which includes: \$42 billion of infrastructure investment to future proof the economy, training and job creation opportunities, programmes to bolster our exports, support for small business to grow and thrive, and policies that prepare New Zealand for the future by making the most of our competitive advantage in renewable energy and waste reduction.

To ensure women aren't left behind, we can't just rely on job growth – our response needs to be purposeful.

In the early stages of our COVID response the Government focused heavily on growing training and apprenticeships. We launched a comprehensive support package for apprentices and their employers, assuring job security for existing apprentices and creating openings for new ones. This was offered in industries that traditionally have a high women employment component – such as community support and mental health care.

We also provided support and pathways for women to enter industries where there is significant growth, such as construction and primary production.

I've read this week of a South Canterbury trucking company that has spoken of the increase in the number of their female workforce – due in part to being more flexible in hours and recognising that their new employees are available to drive from 9.15am – 2.45pm. It is this kind

of flexibility (of course, which not all employers will be able to offer), that can help our women get back into the workforce.

We will reinstate the Training Incentive Allowance to assist soleparents with the costs of getting a degree level tertiary qualification.

We will lift abatement thresholds to ensure that people are not punished by transitioning from a benefit to paid work. We will also support those at risk of long-term unemployment through funding up to an additional 40,000 New Zealanders into work through the Flexiwage programme.

We will continue to invest in our people, to create opportunities and to build the foundations for New Zealand to emerge stronger.

On Thursday 17th December I will be in Methven for a community clinic. I'll be at the Mount Hutt Memorial Hall from 12.30pm – 1.30pm with my new Ashburton MP Support staff member to hear your concerns and issues and to help where I am able.

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### **GROW YOUR OWN**

### Great rain, but sun now needed!

Well the rain was good but now I think we need the sun! Some plants are looking a bit pale, which can be a sign of poor fertility, especially a lack of nitrogen, but at this time of year it probably means lack of sun.

It's still a good time to plant as long as the soil isn't too wet – carrots, beetroot, spring onions, lettuce, zucchini, beans etc but do it before long because we are nearly at peak growing time – long daylight hours, warm soils – so make the most of it and get lots in the ground!

It might be getting a bit late to plant bulbing onions, peas, outdoor tomatoes, peppers, cucumbers or pumpkins. Spinach, silver beet and celery planted now might go directly to seed (bolt) so it might be best to wait til after the longest day.

Brassicas (cabbage, broccoli) will do well if planted now but they take up a lot of room and seeing it is (supposedly) the right conditions for summer veg (zucchini, beans, etc) have a think about priorities if your space is limited.

Space can be well utilised by planting lettuces or a row of radishes in between the cabbages – these will be ready well before the cabbage.



Climbing beans grown on a trellis or teepee also take up less space than rows of dwarf beans



Carrots and parsnips planted a month or so ago will need thinning soon – take out as many as you need to ensure the ones remaining have plenty of room to develop good roots. Potatoes are growing fast and need mounding up and/or mulching.

I have had an unexpected harvest of delicious mushrooms from the mushroom compost I put around plants in the tunnelhouse a few months ago. These grew underneath some broccoli which gave them shade and shelter.

Christmas is on it's way so let's be sustainable Kiwis and give home-made presents or plants, seeds or gardening-related tools and books. The Christmas holidays are a great time to encourage children's interest in gardening and the outdoors – help them build scarecrows, worm farms, raised beds, compost bins, bird covers, teepees for beans, or paint quirky signs or labels for the different vege beds. All of these activities are great fun and are a good way to spend time outside.
